This course is designed to introduce and analyze international relations in East Asia. Clearly, East Asia is one of the most dynamic regions in world politics. During the Cold War, East Asia has gone through intense competition and conflicts between hegemonic powers and among states in the region. In the post-Cold War era, East Asia has been not only the engine of the global economy thanks to Japan and China, but also the center of major power shift, such as rising China, declining the US, and the escalating US-China competition and tension. This course will explore some emerging key issues that would affect international relations in East Asia, such as the US-China strategic competition, the security of supply chains, North Korea nuclear threats, South Korea-Japan's relations, cross-strait crisis between China and Taiwan, the upcoming US president elations and its impact on East Asia, and climate change.
